

# WHAT DO I NEED TO REGISTER?

## Registering to Vote at Your County Auditor's Office or By Mail

When registering to vote at your county auditor's office or by mail, you will need to fill out a Voter Registration Form. You will need either your Iowa driver's license, non-operator ID number or the last FOUR digits of your Social Security Number.

## Registering to Vote Online

When registering to vote online, you will need either your Iowa driver's license, non-operator ID number or the last FIVE digits of your Social Security Number.

To serve as a poll worker, you must:

- Be registered to vote in Iowa
- Be at least 17 years old
- Be a resident of the county you serve in
- Complete the required training.

# REGISTERING TO VOTE IN IOWA

Your voice matters and it starts with knowing your eligibility. You can register to vote in the State of Iowa if you are:

- ☐ A United States citizen
- ☐ At least 17 years old
- ☐ An Iowa resident, with primary residence in the state



You can vote in local, state, and federal elections in Iowa if you:

- ☐ Have not been convicted of a felony and not had your rights restored
- ☐ Will be 18 years old on or before the general election, you will be able to vote in the primary election

# HOW TO REGISTER

## Before Election Day

Completed voter registration forms may be mailed to your county auditor and must be received by 5:00 p.m. CT or postmarked fifteen days prior to the election. Registration forms submitted online must be completed at or before 11:59 p.m. CT, fifteen days prior to the election.

## Within 15 days of Election Day

Any voter that is not registered on or before 15 days of the election may still register and vote by providing proof of identity and residence at the polls. This is called *Election Day Registration* or *Same Day Voter Registration*. This allows Iowans to register to vote during in-person absentee voting at your county auditor's office or at the polling place on Election Day.

# AT THE POLLS ON ELECTION DAY



At check-in, you will show the poll worker your photo ID and your voter registration card. If you are not already registered, you will also be asked for proof of residency.



The poll worker will hand you a blank ballot that shows the races for your voting precinct.



In the voting booth, vote for the candidate(s) of your choice. Make sure you completely fill in the oval.



Exit the booth and place your ballot in the tabulator (large ballot-counting device).

# VOTING WITH DISABILITIES

Every polling place in Iowa must be accessible to voters with disabilities according to federal and state laws.

## Early Absentee Voting in Person

Beginning 20 days before an election, you may vote early absentee in person at your county auditor's office. This might be helpful if you need a little extra time or would prefer assistance.

## Absentee Voting by Mail

Beginning 20 days before an election, you may also request an absentee ballot be mailed to you. Once you have filled it out, it can be mailed back to your county auditor.

## At the Polls

Every polling place in Iowa offers many forms of assistance for voters with disabilities. Each polling place is equipped with a ballot marking device to assist with marking your ballot. Additionally, you may request assistance for reading or marking a ballot either from someone you know or from precinct officials at your polling place. Curbside voting is another option if you are unable to enter the building where the polling place is located.
